Dear Brother Knights of Saskatchewan,

The Knights of Columbus has always responded to the needs of the Church and the community through their charitable and social outreach activities.

As a Catholic, family, fraternal and service organization, we have the responsibility to dedicate our time, treasures and talents to help our parishes become beacons of the new evangelization, a family of families who are filled with the love and joy of the gospel. This can be accomplished by conducting many of the excellent 'Faith In Action Program' with support material available through Supreme.

Pope Francis' Exhortation 'Amoris Laetitia' is a guidebook to help in building the domestic church to become a family of families filled with the Love and Joy of the Gospel. Councils are encouraged to order copies of the guidebook and to work with their Parish Priest in evangelizing the parishioners about the contents of 'Amoris Laetitia'.

Programs are an integral part of a healthy council. Supreme and State have many programs for councils that are easy to organize and have information ready to run the programs. "Faith In Action Programs" for councils during the next 3 months could be the following: Rosary Program, Marion Prayer Program, Holy Hour, Family of the Month/Year, Family Prayer Night, Coats For Kids, Wheelchair Program, Free Throw Championship, Helping Hands (a program that helps others), Special Olympics, Mass for People With Special Needs and Novena for Life. A priority for Feb. 1st and 2nd or for a weekend that works in your parish is to conduct the Vocations Endowment Campaign in every Parish including parishes where there is no Knights of Columbus presence. Information can be found at <https://www.kofcfoundation.com/sask-k-of-c-vocations>

Other projects to consider are making a donation to the Saskatchewan Indoor Games, to Special Olympics, for Wheelchairs or for Coats for Kids.

Important forms needing attention are the Fraternal Survey (1728), Profile with Special Olympics (4584), Semi-Annual Audit (1295), and the Program reporting Form (10784).

The Convention this year in Prince Albert with the theme 'Knights of Fraternity, United In Charity' is fast approaching. Councils are encouraged to submit resolutions, to name delegates to attend, to submit single projects in the four program areas (Faith, Family, Community, and Life). to submit the Program Reports for the State Program Awards, to submit an entry for State Family of the Year, and to submit their Necrology report. The convention package will be sent to councils by the end of January.

Also, elections will be held this year for all State Board positions and for 6 delegates to attend the Supreme Convention in Washington, DC.

If you are interested in letting your name stand for a position on the State Board or to attend the Supreme Convention as a delegate representing Saskatchewan, talk to State Deputy Chris for more info.

Please mark the Spiritual Enrichment weekend (March 12, 13th) on your calendar. The Spiritual Enrichment Committee is planning an excellent 2 days again this year.

The launching of the new Exemplification of Charity, Unity, and Fraternity will also be held after the Enrichment Weekend Closing Mass. The degree will be held in honor of the Bishops of Saskatchewan. This will be a great opportunity to see the new degree and all councils are encouraged to bring candidates to the degree.

Remember to enter a team into the State Curling which will be held in Meadow Lake on January 31st, Feb. 1 and Feb. 2nd. There will be prizes for each team win or lose.

Membership is also a very important part of a successful council. Each council should recruit a minimum of one new member each year to bring new ideas and new members into their council.

To date, only 30 councils have recruited a new member. Saskatchewan is doing very well with 188 members to date in 7th Spot overall. Special thanks to all those who have recruited new members and thanks to Membership Director Marte Nogot, the membership team and to the council leadership.

Online membership is a great way to recruit younger members. We can reach out to them in the community at functions. This might be the only connection they have to the Catholic Faith which may eventually bring them to get involved in the Church and Council.

The retention of the present members is also very important. Most councils are operating on 20% or less capacity. Just think of what could be accomplished if all councils doubled or tripled their performance. Please refer to the State Website (www.kofcsask.com) for a document called 'How To Encourage Member Participation'. This document contains 26 ideas that work.

Time is going by quickly and there is still much work to do. I encourage each of you to continue to do the great work of Charity, of Evangelization, of supporting vocations and our priests, of developing future leaders and continuing your efforts in recruitment, retention, and engagement of members.

Also, remember to conduct a church drive in your parish before the end of February. Church drives are important

State Chaplain's Message

Unity Through Desire - the key to Eternal Life

The Family as Domestic Church/ Missionary Disciples Through Faith In Action 2020-01-11

Dear Brother Knights and Families,

That is the secret little thought that many think in their minds when they meet with someone new, "What do I have in common with you?". Perhaps that is how a family or a person sizes up a new relationship with a stranger. It could be a common sports team, expression of art, language, cultural or racial aspect. It could be as simple as waiting for a ticket in line or waiting to pay for groceries when that thought faintly passes through your mind, "what do I have in common with you?".

It is safe to say that **what** many people have in common with others is a certain desire - '*a desire to know* what we have in common with each other'. The fact is, we may decide far too often that we don't have something in common with another person based on What We Have Materially. But, if we look a little deeper on an emotional or spiritual level, we will discover we have a great deal in common with a lot of people. People desire.

Beyond basic necessities of life, we desire friendship and fraternity. We desire company. We desire self-worth. We desire purpose in life. We desire dignity. We desire forgiveness. We desire to forgive. We desire joy! So through these numerous desires, we can hazard a guess that we have a great deal in common with every other person on the planet.

Taking it one more step, as Knights of Columbus, we have a great deal in common with other knights who desire to give and to serve. When you actually think about it, this deep desire to give and to serve is one of the manifestations of God dwelling in our hearts. This is your personal faith . . . in action. Since 'knowing God dwells in me' is not just so I can have a nice fuzzy feeling, this indwelling Trinity compels me to give this powerful awareness to others. Seen properly, the desires we have in our hearts are good desires that come from the indwelling Holy Spirit.

So what about the desires that are not so holy? What about desires 'gone wrong' that find a place in our hearts, where selfishness or mental illness leads to desires to commit sin, perhaps desires to commit crimes, desires to end suffering by ending our lives. It would appear that we don't have certain things in common with others on one level, yet generally, we do have weakness, illness, and sin in common. So the deeper human desires remain - together everyone

wants purpose, forgiveness, and a chance to forgive like Christ forgives, to love others as God loves them.

Faith In Action strives to assist us. It highlights 4 areas in our lives so that we can shape our thoughts about each other: Our Faith; Our Family; Our Community; and Our Gift of Life.

So try these 'glasses' on for a short while and see what happens. Try seeing everyone you interact with at home or church or at work by changing the fleeting thought through your mind from "what do I have in common with this person?" to something more like, "I have a desire for faith, family community, and life in common with this person"! I have these desires in common with them. The God dwelling in my heart dwells in their heart. Despite common sinfulness, we have an overwhelming desire to live out our faith, to live for our families, to live for our communities, to live life as it was a gift. Consequently, try approaching every potential new knight with that very thought.

Perhaps you can make this part of your daily prayer list, seeing others with that in common, a desire for faith, family, community and the gift of life. In cooperation with your council, look for opportunities to engage yourself and your family in activities that enhance this.

Faith in Action is a way to organize better an outlook on life. If you put time into it, your spouse will notice, your children will notice, your brother knights will be strengthened and potential knights will notice how God is using you to Act on those things God places on your heart and that you believe in.

Associate State Chaplain's Message

When Samuel was called by the Lord, he responded with the words, "Speak, Lord, your servant is listening." These were the words that the priest Eli had instructed him to say upon hearing God call to him, but Samuel's words can also be a wonderful directive in how we should spend, at least some of our prayer time. Very often we fill our prayer with words; memorized prayers, the reading of Scripture, Rosaries and such, all of which are good, but unfortunately we include little or no time in silence. In these words of Samuel, we are reminded that our prayer should also include times of listening when we allow our Lord to speak to us. After all, Samuel did not say, "Listen, Lord, your servant is speaking."

A few weeks ago the Fellowship of Catholic University Students' biennial SEEK Conference was held in Indianapolis with over 17,000 youth participants attending. It included periods of silent reflection, at Mass and other times of prayer, but the strongest period of silent prayer was during Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament, which, through the Knights of Columbus, included the relic of the Incorrupt Heart of Saint Jean Vianney, a relic that will be coming to Canada in the near future.

This silent, listening prayer, which was such a central element of these young Catholic's spiritual experience in Indianapolis, is a very important option of our "Faith in Action" program. Adoration and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament is an ancient tradition of our faith, which is particularly aimed at including silent, 'listening time,' while

sitting in the real presence of the Lord in the Eucharist. I encourage every Council to speak with their Chaplain with the desire of hosting a Council or Parish wide Hour of Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament. God is calling us to come and pray with him, in words, but also listening to what he wants us to hear.

Now is the time to make some adjustments for the better. How is the Council's performance? Are we recruiting? Are we promoting insurance to our members? Are we doing quality programs? Communications: are we making personal contact or just sending emails hoping for members to read them. Are we being leaders in our Councils or just being managers? Has the Council completed the Fraternal Survey (form 1728)? Is the Council aware of the renewed Start Council incentive (\$4.50 / member for achieving Star Council)? While yes there were many more things discussed, these were the main things that stood out for me to share and to focus on.

I do hope members are watching the Supreme's webinars when they are able. The information can provide insight or confirmation on the activities of the Council and provide information for advancement.

If anyone ever has any questions about any topics relevant to the Knights, please do not hesitate to email me or any State Board member for help, we are here to help serve the Councils.



STATE CEREMONIAL REPORT

Most of you have probably heard about the new degree which is being implemented throughout the Order in the next few months. Please refer to the memorandum from Thomas McCaffrey which was sent to State, District and Council officers.

Please refer to the following items as we move forward to implement the new degree in our Jurisdiction of Saskatchewan.

- Degree work in Saskatchewan is under the direction and supervision of the State Deputy and State Ceremonials Chairman. State Ceremonials Chairman Denis and I attended the SD Midterm Meeting in November where we saw the new degree live and were given recommendations and timelines for implementation.
- Denis and I will proceed as follows:
 - A meeting will be held with the ceremonial teams, representative DDs and Grand Knights to discuss and develop an implementation plan of the new degree, timelines, what to do with present degree paraphernalia, and to define quality control criteria for the delivery of the new degree.
 - We feel there needs to be input to develop some guidelines and criteria to put in place before we begin exemplifying the degree. The date of the meeting will be determined soon with an email sent to all those expected to attend.
 - A component of the plan will be to develop teams of present degree work volunteers and others who are prepared to deliver the degree in a dignified and professional manner. The goal is to start with 2 or 3 teams per cluster and then to expand the number to hopefully have a minimum of 1 good team per district.
 - **All those interested in being part of the degree team are asked to contact the District Deputy who will forward names to the Cluster Leader.**
 - The plan will be presented to the State Board for approval. After approval, the plan will be communicated to all those in leadership positions at the District and Council levels.
 - **The launching of the Exemplification of Charity, Unity, and Fraternity will be held after the Spiritual Enrichment closing Mass on Saturday, MARCH 14 at Holy Family Cathedral in Saskatoon. More information will be sent to councils shortly.**
 - A Degree Team will be put in place to deliver the degree.
- As with any other new program, time is needed to develop a plan to implement the new degree properly. Please be patient until we get the final plan of procedures for you.



STURLING RULES

RULES EXPLANATION

1. Sweeping/brushing is allowed only from the hog line to the back of the house at the playing end. This provides fairness to those with physical limitations, unable to sweep/brush. It also increases the challenge, not having the extra advantage of sweeping/brushing to affect either line or weight in the initial travel of the stone.
2. Each team is comprised of two players. This rule follows from rule 1 (above); with no sweeping/brushing between hog lines, a four-member team would often have two people inactive. This way, everyone is always occupied, either delivering or skipping. Teams are easier to form and coordinate.
3. One member of each team stays at each end of the rink, and must not cross center ice. This reduces movement up and down the ice, and increases the pace of the game. It also means responsibilities are equally shared by the two team members, and provides variety for each player.
4. The two delivering players alternately deliver 6 stones each per end, while their teammate skips that end. Then roles are reversed, and the partners deliver the stones back. This implies that each player is always occupied, doing something interesting. 18 stones are delivered per person each game, compared to 16 (8 ends) or 20 (10 ends) in regular curling.
5. All games are six ends. In case of a tie, an extra end is played, with each player delivering 3 stones (skips and deliverers exchange roles at the midpoint of an extra end). Three ends of delivery times 6 stones per end means each person delivers 18 stones per game, about the same as regular curling. Games progress quickly and interest remains high, both for the players and spectators. The incidence and degree of lop-sided games is greatly reduced, and hardly ever does a team surrender before the end of the game.
6. No stone may be removed from play prior to delivery of the fourth stone of each end. If that should happen, the delivered stone is removed from play and all other stones are returned to their original positions. With fewer stones used, and fewer ends, the stick game tends to be more defensive than the regular game. This rule makes the game more offensive, thus more interesting for competitors and fans. In effect, this rule extends the free guard zone to include the area from the hogline to the backline, as the FGZ was originally proposed.
7. The delivery may begin with (a) either foot in either hack, or (b) from anywhere inside the near hog line with the stone touching the centre line. All stones must be released before reaching the hog line.


